



English - Minibeast Fact File (page 7)

Children should choose a minibeast they would like to create a fact file for. If they don't have all the information they need to complete it they could look it up in a book, use the internet to search for it, or ask the people in their home. When they have the information they need, they can complete the sections by answering the questions using sentences. The sentences should include conjunctions to link the ideas together and adjectives to make the sentences more exciting. Conjunctions are words like and, or, but, if and because. Including conjunctions in sentences expands the sentences by giving more detail or explanation. For example: A ladybird has wings and a red shell, but the wings are hidden underneath the shell to keep them safe. Adjectives are also known as describing words, and add extra detail making the writing more exciting to read. For example: A beautiful butterfly with bright, colourful wings. Every sentence should also begin with a capital letter to show the start of the sentence and end with a full stop to show the sentence is finished.

Question 1 – In this question a sentence has been written with all possessive apostrophes missing. A possessive apostrophe is used to show something belongs to someone or something.

Singular nouns show possession using an apostrophe followed by an s, for example: the boy's football. Singular nouns which end in s follow the same rule, for example: the bus's wheel. Plural nouns which end in s show possession using an apostrophe after the s, for example: the girls' books.

Decide which words in the sentence need a possessive apostrophe. The correct answer is: wizard's; enemy's

Question 2 – This question shows three sentences which all include apostrophes. Choose the sentence which is using a possessive apostrophe (as described in question 1) correctly.

The correct answer is: B

Question 3 – This question shows sentences which have used apostrophes incorrectly and asks children to find and explain the mistakes.

The correct answer is: In sentence A, Daniel has put the apostrophe between the e and s, rather than after the s. In sentence B, he added a possessive apostrophe to the noun 'streets' when it is plural, not possessive.

Maths - Efficient Subtraction

Question 5 – Children must think about whether the formal written method is the most efficient method for the given calculation or whether another method would be more efficient. They must write a sentence to explain their choice and then create a calculation where the column method would be most efficient.

Is this method efficient? The correct answer is No, the method is not efficient. Counting on in hundreds would be more efficient as the numbers are close and the tens and ones have the same value. A calculation where numbers are not easily subtracted mentally is an appropriate answer.

Question 6 – Children must read Alan's statement and decide if they agree or disagree with him about the need to use the column method to check all subtractions. They must then write a sentence to explain their choice.

Do you agree with Alan? An example correct answer is the column method is for a specific type of subtraction, not just for checking. However, column method can be used for efficient subtraction.

Question 7 – Children must read both Ivy and Ted's statements and complete the given calculation using both methods. Then they must decide whose method was quickest and write a sentence to explain why. Ivy's method is to add one to each number in the calculation and partition into thousands, hundreds, tens and ones to subtract each separately. Ted's method is to count on using a number line.

Which was quickest? The correct answer is Ivy's method should be quicker as 7,284 – 5,180 requires no exchanges and can easily be done using partitioning. This can be done on a number line, but is less efficient.
