MESSAGE FROM MR DYER, THE HEAD TEACHER

- I want to start by saying well done to the children who have made a great start to term. This is an important term for really pushing on with progress and learning and it has been a good first two weeks. There is a calm and purposeful atmosphere in the school, and good enthusiasm from the children. Da iawn plant.
- I would also like to thank parents for the way you work with us through the support you give your children to be ready for learning. 'Be Ready' is one of our school rules indeed it is a watchword for being able to achieve and it is a pleasure to welcome children in to school each morning who are already 'ready for learning' and ready to enjoy their day.
- I would like to ask for some continuing help: I am grateful that many of you ensure that you do not bring your dogs close to our gates and doors where pupils come in and out of school. We certainly don't want children to learn to be afraid of dogs, but this helps the very few children who may have real anxiety about dogs, as well as keeping everyone safe. Sometimes parents do this by leaving their dogs further away when collecting children. Can I ask however, that you are careful not to leave your dog tethered and unaccompanied on the main routes near the school, even if this is not directly outside the school. Thank you.
- I wonder what your reaction would be if I told you that if school was only open Monday to Thursday, then we would hit our attendance target of 95%. Unfortunately, because the Friday average is barely 93%, our overall figure takes a real hit. You know of course that the learning on Friday is just as important as the other days, but I wonder if there is a general feeling that Friday is not as important. But Friday is important it is 20% of children's education for one thing, and it also means that habits and routines being ready for learning are not interrupted for long periods. So, let's make it our mission to vigilant about Fridays, and do let us know if there are things that you think would make a difference.


